# Using our gifts to make sure that Everyone Belongs: The Growing Friendship Between L'Arche Preston and Fulwood Methodist Church

L'Arche is an international federation of communities where people with and without intellectual disabilities live, work, and grow together. Founded on the belief that every person has unique gifts to offer, L'Arche creates places of belonging where everyone is valued and accepted just as they are. It's a vision that resonates deeply with us at Fulwood Methodist Church—because here too, everyone belongs. And as we write this, we remember with thanks the early work with pioneers from the Church such as Stephen Grice, and others.

As a result, that shared sense of belonging has flourished beautifully over the past few years between Fulwood Methodist Church and the L'Arche Preston community. Our own connection began in 2017, when our son Ben, who lives in one of the L'Arche houses known as The Loom, started attending services at Fulwood. From the very beginning, Ben was welcomed with open arms. The congregation accepted him wholeheartedly, not just as a visitor, but as part of the church family—someone who belongs, contributes, and shares in the life of the church.



In those early days, Fulwood already had special evenings for people with disabilities, offering a place for friendship, worship, and joy. As Ben became more involved, the church community found ways to include him further. One Christmas, he proudly lit the Advent candles—a real highlight for him—and he sometimes helps by taking the collection during Sunday services. These small but meaningful acts of participation have helped Ben feel truly part of the church, and his confidence and happiness have grown as a result.

The partnership between L'Arche Preston and Fulwood Methodist Church has continued to deepen. L'Arche uses the church's excellent

facilities regularly for their own activities, and as they do, the two communities naturally overlap and enrich each other's lives. One of the most popular groups is Soupercraft—a cleverly named workshop where participants enjoy both "soup" and "craft"! Each week, around thirteen of the L'Arche core members gather in the church to share food, conversation, and creativity. Volunteers and members of the congregation often come along to lend a hand, chat, or simply join in the fun. Core members from Moor Fold, the other L'Arche house in Preston, regularly enjoy friendship, brunch and the New to You stalls at the Welcome Wednesday event, run by volunteers from the church community. It's a wonderful xample of how inclusion and friendship grow naturally when people spend time together.

L'Arche also uses the church facilities for gatherings, such as their Voice and Power meetings and other community celebrations. Regularly the whole L'Arche community—core members, assistants, staff, and friends—come together for a gathering at the church for a time of sharing, singing, and joy. Events like these remind us of how fortunate we are to have such a well-equipped and welcoming space where everyone can come together in unity and celebration.


One of the highlights of recent years was the joint church-L'Arche

#### Using our gifts to deepen our Fellowship Together – Home Groups

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We all experience many ups and downs in life. As Christians, we can sometimes find comfort in a loving God and in Jesus who knows what it means to be human. However, sometimes our experiences can lead to difficult questions: 'Why is this happening to me?' The world we live in can be both a wonderful and a devastating place. An age-old question: 'Why does God allow suffering?' might often trouble us.

Our spiritual journeys also go through peaks and troughs, as we wrestle with prayer, the Bible and living out our lives in a way that shares the love of God with others. Sitting in a pew at church and listening to the service on a Sunday morning (joining in with songs and prayers, reflecting on the sermon, meeting together for coffee afterwards) can be a positive way to help build up our faith and learn more about God. However, it's not the easiest place to have deep conversations, particularly on a personal level. Church services tend to be more passive than active, and while this can feed us spiritually, it doesn't necessarily allow us the chance to ask questions, express our doubts and fears and look how the Bible relates to us personally.

This is where home groups come in. Meeting as a small group within someone's home and exploring relevant topics together can be a huge boost to our personal journeys with God, and to our fellowship. It's good to hear others expressing the same doubts that have been swirling around in our own heads, and to 'open up' about how different parts of the Bible make us feel, or what's going on in our lives and the world. Of course, we can also gain much from simply

attending, listening and quietly reflecting, but as we get to know a small group of other Christians, it can become easier to feel comfortable and safe sharing our lives with each other.

At Fulwood, we are currently trialling three fortnightly home groups (on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays) with roughly 25 people attending in total. There is no pressure to attend every session, no pressure to speak if you'd prefer to just listen and absorb, and no

pressure to keep going if you've tried it out and found it's not for you. But there are friends to be made, enlightening and uplifting conversations to be had and new ideas to explore. There might also be biscuits!

Using the gifts we have received so that as a whole Church we can offer ourselves to God in Worship

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"We are a worshipping community: do the opportunities which we create to worship God make the best use of all the gifts we have been given?" An early priority for the new Church Leadership Team was to address this fundamental question. We offered a questionnaire in which we asked, what in our different styles of worship most helped us

to worship and feel God's presence as we believe that only by fully engaging people in worship can we release our many gifts.

Thank you to the forty or more respondents who came back to us. You enabled us to report fully to the Church Council in September.

The Sunday morning service in its different styles was appreciated by everyone: however, it was perhaps not surprising that we received a mixture of responses. Where these might lead us is a question which will remain under regular consideration.

It is quite clear that many value the traditional patterns and shapes of our worship, and the Sunday morning service in its different styles was appreciated by everyone. The resources we need to design and lead worship continue to change, presenting both opportunity and challenge. Our diversification as a Church community, and the pressures arising from the social and economic lives of young families which create new patterns of church attendance must be a factor in the opportunities we create.

Specific requests were for a quiet meditative service occasionally and another for more Bible study and teaching. We now have an opportunity to look at these comments in the context of being GIFTED. For some time it has been our practice to be involved in arranging and leading the worship we offer to God. The Methodist Church offers us considerable freedom in this direction. The Church Council is convinced that within the Church are additional gifts and talents which could enrich the worship we offer to God.

So, what might we expect in the future? Opportunities will be sought to diversify our patterns of worship to include a quieter service at 4pm once a month on a Sunday (see the list of seasonal events at the back of this magazine). In addition, we hope that we might find ways of rejuvenating the mid-week Wednesday morning worship. Messy

Church and Forest Church offer opportunities also for differing forms of worship. The need for more Bible study opportunities has been addressed through developing homegroups which are already being enjoyed by many.

Most of all though the Church wants to continue to hear from you – not only about what you might wish to see develop and how, but also about how you are being challenged to offer your gifts in worship

# Using our gifts to help young children develop and their mothers to prosper

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Toddlers Group is available for very young children from infancy to the age of five, so long as they bring along a responsible adult - Mums, Dads, Uncles, Aunties, Grandparents can all fit the bill. Together with the helpers we are a happy and noisy group who meet most weeks of the year.

We always tell the adults they can have as much caffeine as they need while they're with us – some of them need a lot to keep them going after sleepless nights. We also offer drinks for the children along with a huge selection of biscuits. Toast and tea bread are a speciality!

So, why do we meet? We want to use our gifts to enable children to socialise and gain new experiences and, just as important, to offer carers and, especially, Mums to have some adult conversation. The helpers are all Mums too and remember the feelings and pressures that can build for those at home with young children. The health and wellbeing of Mums is of huge importance to us as we seek to make all

welcome. Over the years we know how important this opportunity has been for some beleaguered mothers.

Of course, the volunteers also put the world to rights while working in the kitchen. Watching the young children exploring toys and new challenges, meeting new friends, avoiding what they may not be ready to face is all part of the fun. And then the moment arrives when the youngster is ready to move on – nursery or school – when it is time for farewells, and the joy of knowing that a job has been well done.

Toddlers' Group has been in existence now for nearly 60 years and numbers go up and come down as the birthrate and social policy for preschool provision changes. Consequently, we are well stocked with equipment and playthings, and a craft table adds to the fun (and mess). Each session concludes with a singalong in a separate space whilst things are safely put away for another week.

New members and helpers are always welcome. Just come, dip your toe in the water, and see if it is for you. We meet on a Friday morning between 9.30 and 11.30 and we are one of few Toddler Groups in the area to meet most Fridays during school holidays

#### God's gifts at work in Sunday Club

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#### Welcome Back!

We were very pleased to welcome back our wonderful children and young people to Sunday Club in September. Every child receives a 'Welcome Pack' each year, with the all-important registration form along with a few goodies. This year the glow-in-the-dark bouncy balls went down particularly well.

#### **Our Group Themes**

In Explorers (KS1) and Pathfinders (KS2) the theme for the term has been Old Testament Heroes (and Heroines!). We've used a variety of activities including games, songs, videos, discussion, drama and crafts to explore the stories of some key Old Testament figures. Explorers have used the focus of 'Hopes and Dreams', to link these

stories together, looking at Abraham & Sarah, Jacob & Esau, Rachel & Leah, Joseph, Esther and Ruth & Naomi. Pathfinders begin to look at the Bible in greater depth and detail, and have focused on Abraham, Moses, Deborah and David. To see some examples of our work, and the Bible verses we have been



thinking about, you can look at our Sunday Club display board in church.

Pathfinders Plus (high school) follow either the lectionary readings or their own themes. This term they have been studying the books of 1 and 2 Timothy, again using games, discussion, a variety of media such as worship songs and video clips and drama to explore the Bible and how it relates to our lives today.

Our youngest group – Seekers (pre-school) is currently struggling for members. If you know of anyone with little ones looking for a child-friendly church, please do point them in our direction!

**Forest Church** Once a term, Sunday Club goes out and about in Highgate Woods for a Forest Church session. This term our session will



link into the Old Testament Heroes theme. We will be constructing our own shelter and considering the nomadic tent-dwelling life of many of the characters we have been studying. We will also enjoy a hot chocolate inside our tent while we listen to some different versions of these stories and consider how God was with our heroes wherever they went. Developing this idea further, we will look at Psalm 18:1-2 and consider how God acts as a shelter to us today: "I love you, Lord! You are my strength. The Lord is my Rock, my fortress, my place of safety. He is my God, the Rock I run to for protection. He is my shield; by his power I am saved. He is my hiding place high in the hills."

#### Using our gifts to tell the Christmas story afresh

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So, using our gifts...

How might we tell the Christmas story in a fresh way whilst maintaining its majestic meaning?

How do we attract children and adults to an event with that aim in mind and engage with them?

How do we show that Christmas is more than just getting presents?

How do we celebrate the joy of Christmas with all its noise and bustle but also promote awe and wonder?

So many questions with no easy answers but trying to respond to these issues has led to the creation of our Advent Celebration, now in its fourth year. We aim to provide an experience which will be meaningful both for children and adults and allow us all to celebrate Christmas with joy and wonder. The celebration is deliberately held on Advent Sunday (the fourth Sunday before Christmas) to set the scene for all the events in the coming weeks of December - parties, shopping,

pantomimes and concerts - when it is easy to forget some of the essential meaning of the season.

We appreciate that most children and many adults learn through doing and moving and so we begin our session with activities related to the theme and later move from 'station' to 'station' to explore different aspects of the nativity story. It is difficult to imagine celebration – at least in Methodist circles - without thinking of food or at least some refreshments and we therefor enable different sections of the church family to eat together and enjoy each other's company. The mood then changes as we move on to re-tell the Christmas story by using readers from our congregation to act out some of the key parts of the narrative.

A special atmosphere is promoted by the darkness and candlelight and the groups of children and adults process from one station to the next as the story enfolds. All the groups come together to consider the significance of what they have heard. This year '**Gifted'** will be the theme for our Advent Celebration on November 30<sup>th</sup>. Do sign up and join us. (See the notice by the kitchen hatch)

Carols are sung either at the beginning or the end of the celebration and after the blessing the children receive an Advent calendar from the church which features the story we have been relaying. Reading through this description, it sounds as if everything goes like clockwork and all aspects seamlessly run together — what could possibly go wrong? As you can imagine the potential for a few 'mishaps' is enormous! At the end of the event, when all the Sunday Club leaders are seriously thinking of lying down in a darkened room we remember, that over a hundred people will have once again experienced the Christmas story in a meaningful way.

Originally written in Latin as *Adeste Fideles*, the carol has a rich history and has remained popular for centuries due to its powerful message, beautiful music, and deep religious meaning.

#### **Historical Origins**

The carol is believed to have been written in the mid-18th century. The earliest known version is attributed to **John Francis Wade**, an English Catholic who lived in exile in France after the Jacobite rising. Wade worked as a music copyist and wrote or transcribed the Latin hymn *Adeste Fideles* around 1743. While there has been some debate about whether Wade actually composed the music or simply copied it, he is generally credited with the version we know today. The hymn originally had eight Latin verses, though most modern versions use only four or five. The lyrics celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ and call on the faithful to come and adore Him, echoing the story of the shepherds and wise men visiting the Christ child.

English Translation and Spread

The carol became more widely known in the English-speaking world in the 19th century. Frederick Oakeley, an Anglican priest who later became Catholic, translated Adeste Fideles into English in 1841. His version, beginning with the words "O Come, All Ye Faithful, joyful and triumphant," captured the spirit and meaning of the original Latin text while making it accessible to a wider audience.

This English version quickly gained popularity, especially in Victorian England, a time when Christmas traditions, hymns, and carols were experiencing a revival. The carol was published in many hymnals and became a regular part of church services, particularly on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

Why It Became Popular: There are several reasons why "O Come, All Ye Faithful" has remained so popular:

- 1. **Up lifting Message**: The lyrics focus on joy, adoration, and the divinity of Christ. The call to worship is both personal and communal, drawing people together in celebration.
- 2. **Memorable Melody**: The tune is strong, stately, and easy to sing. Its repetitive structure and rising melody create a sense of triumph and grandeur that fits the Christmas season perfectly.
- 3. **Widespread Use**: The carol is sung in churches, schools, concerts, and homes. It has been translated into many languages and adapted into numerous musical styles, helping it cross cultural and denominational boundaries.
- 4. **Emotional Connection**: For many, singing this carol is a cherished part of Christmas tradition, evoking memories of family, worship, and celebration. "O Come, All Ye Faithful" has stood the test of time as a powerful and beloved

Carol. With its rich history, inspiring lyrics, and beautiful melody, it continues to invite people around the world to reflect on the true meaning of Christmas and join together in joyful worship.

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



## Additional information about Fulwood Methodist Church – Sunday Services and Worship at other times.

Each Sunday, from around 10.00AM – The Church is open for fellowship and there is an opportunity to sit quietly, if you prefer, and usually to hear the hymns and other music chosen for the day. 10.30AM – MORNING WORSHIP AND SUNDAY CLUB - At this point we all meet in Church to worship God within our tradition. All ages are welcome to meet in the Church for 10.30. Most weeks we provide a safely supervised creche for very young children whose parents/carers prefer to use such provision at any stage during our time together. In addition, there are other separate spaces to which those who wish can retreat if they find that necessary!

Normally everyone meets in Church for a short period of worship before the children and young people move to their Sunday Club which is organised according to age and led by staff with appropriate training and experience. Once each month (normally on the second Sunday),

and on other special occasions, All-Together worship enables the children and young people to remain in Church for the whole service. Some such services are also Parade Services involving the uniformed organisations.

Once each month, usually on the first Sunday, morning worship includes a celebration of Holy Communion to which all are invited. WORSHIP AT OTHER TIMES. Special arrangements are made for services during Christian Festivals. Occasionally, a quieter service is arranged for around 4.00pm on a Sunday afternoon. These are clearly advertised beforehand in our weekly Notices and on the Church website.

Baptisms, Weddings and Funerals can be held by arrangements which need to be made through the Rev'd Jane Wild (01772 715134). Please ring her as necessary.

A Church mini-bus service is available on most Sunday mornings and for special events. This is a free service and information about routes, and the timetable can be obtained most Sunday mornings at Church. 11.30 AM (approx.) – after our worship concludes, many people remain to enjoy light drinks such as coffee and tea, to make new friends and to share news.
