Minister's Reflections

From Revd. Malcolm Hickox

Once again this annual report gives a 'snap shot' of the last twelve months at Fulwood Methodist Church and highlights the amazing quantity of activity which takes place each week on the Church premises or elsewhere in the name of the Church. It's a poignant report for me, not just because it will be the last I shall contribute to as Minister of the Church, but more particularly because it marks a significant transition in my life as I prepare to 'sit down' from full-time ministry. Sitting down is another of those uniquely Methodist expressions, chosen to emphasise that Methodist Ministers don't actually retire. We are still under the discipline of the Methodist Conference and are expected to continue to offer our time, skills and experience to the Church as 'unpaid' supernumerary ministers for as long as we are physically able. As such, I will have the opportunity to say 'yes' or 'no' to requests for assistance and perhaps even to develop areas of ministry that have not been possible in the past due to other pressures and demands. So, in many ways, I shall be much like any church member following their own journey of discipleship, which is a reminder that we are all called and challenged to offer our time, skills and experience as we seek to follow where Christ leads. It's also a reminder that we belong together as part of the Body of Christ, giving honour, recognition and respect to each other. As I reflect on the people who make up the Body of Christ here at Fulwood, I'm conscious of the debt we owe to so many who give unstintingly of their time and talents. We have a comparatively small leadership team, but it is the contribution of the many others which enables all the different activities and groups to function week by week, many of whom contribute behind the scenes, enabling our property, finance and administration to function efficiently. You can read about all they do in this report, but please pause as you do and offer thanks for their service. At the same time, can I challenge you to reflect on whether you might also be able to offer your service to undertake a particular task in the Church or work on a new venture.

Fulwood Methodist Church has always been known for its commitment to children and young people and it is good to report that all our youth and children's groups are thriving, in fact some of them are full to capacity. That frequently means that we are in need of additional helpers. With the departure of Yasha Mashoko in May 2016, I took on her responsibilities for overseeing the youth, children's and family activities in the Church. However, I am grateful that the Church Council agreed to continue to employ Stuart Johnson as a sessional youth worker for our Friday evening 'open' groups, Escape! and the Youth Club. Stuart has given stability to that important work and enabled our very committed team of volunteers to blossom and contribute their own skills. Recognising that Fulwood Methodist Church needs the services of two full-time ministers and reviewing the diaconal role that had been undertaken by Yasha, the Circuit decided not to seek a diaconal replacement, but to create a full-time lay Youth, Children's & Family Worker post. The initial hope and expectation was that someone would be in post by the end of 2016. The disappointment that this has not been possible has recently been compensated by the fact that we now believe that we have made an excellent appointment in offering the post to Darren Arnold. He will start on 1st August and will bring with him significant experience of undertaking similar work in two other appointments.

Last year we reported on the appointment of Sharon Beck as our part-time Church Administrator to undertake the administration of the Theatre Group and general administration for the Church. Sharon has proved to be a real asset to the Theatre Group as new booking and administrative procedures have been introduced during the year. She has also used her previous employment experience for the benefit of the Church in negotiating new contracts for the Church and saving us significant sums of money. This report gives me the opportunity to thank Sharon for all her hard work and commitment.

This report is clearly about the life and work of Fulwood Methodist Church, but it is important that we understand Christian discipleship not to be limited to the activities we undertake in our building or collectively as a Church. I am therefore encouraged by the fact that a good number of our members are involved in voluntary service in the local community. Several make a very significant contribution to the Churches Together help desk at the hospital, to local schools and to the work of Methodist Action North West, to name just three areas. I am delighted to be able to acknowledge their important service at the same time as thanking everyone who contributes in any way to the life and witness of our Church. I offer a special word of appreciation to our Church Stewards and Sue Penrith, our Pastoral Secretary, who form the Church Leadership Team with myself. Without their commitment and enthusiasm, we would not have been able to undertake so much of our Church's mission. On a personal note, I offer them my warm appreciation for their support and encouragement to me and frequent concern for my work load. The last five years have been challenging and rewarding for me in equal measure and I can honestly say that I am grateful that the Methodist Conference sent me here. From the outset, with the Church's Centenary Celebrations and the Preston Guild in my first month, the pace has not slackened and I have only been able to sustain the 'full-on' demands of this appointment with the support and encouragement of Christine. I thank her not only for the last five years, but for her partnership over the entire period of my ministry and look forward to all that we may be able to share together in pastures new.

General Overview from the Church Stewards

Libby Stone has served as a Steward for several years now and feels it is time to step down. We thank Libby for her quiet but faithful support in all our work and responsibilities. We are fortunate to have a good team of Worship Stewards who help us each Sunday morning to set up for worship and we were joined in the summer by Mary Jackson and Pam Wright.

If you feel called to be either a Church Steward, or a Worship Steward, please have a conversation with Malcolm or any of the Stewards to see what the work entails and if you would be able to assist. The more people we have, the easier the load.

Last summer the team worked hard with the help of Ken Wales to produce our vision for the future and I hope that the whole church family felt able to contribute to the final document which we produced in the autumn. These goals will help us work together over the next year to enable our work to develop and focus whilst we have the change-over of our staff team.

Last year was a busy and difficult time as we realised that Yasha would be leaving us in the summer. Sadly, Yasha was unable to continue to Ordination and has left the Diaconal Order for the moment. She and the family still live in Preston and we continue to pray for them as they work together as a family to discern their future.

During the summer the stationing process began to find a new minister for our Circuit who will have responsibility for Fulwood. We were very pleased to welcome Jane Wild when she was invited to visit in November. I am very happy that, subject to confirmation by Conference, Jane, Stuart and their three daughters will move into the manse at Victoria Road in August. Jane's husband Stuart is also a Methodist minister and, again subject to

Conference, will take up an appointment in the Bolton and Rochdale District in September. We look forward to formally welcoming Jane and the family into the circuit at a special service at Fulwood on Friday 1st September at 7.30pm. We hope you will support this special service.

With the departure of Yasha the Church and Circuit entered discussions to decide the best way forward for work with our families and young people. It was decided that the Circuit would look to appoint a Youth, Children's and Family Worker for Fulwood. To that end the Circuit advertised just after Christmas and following interviews were pleased to appoint Darren Arnold who is currently working in Horsham, Sussex. Darren is an experienced Youth and Family Worker and will be joining the Circuit staff team on the 1st August. We will also give him a formal welcome at the service on the 1st September. Darren is married to Cheryl and they have two teenage sons, with an older daughter in Nottingham. Please help them to settle into their new life in the north and especially as part of the Fulwood Church Family!

Sadly, as you are all aware, this is Malcolm's final appointment as a minister before 'sitting down' as they say in Methodism. Malcolm and Christine will move to their new home and life in Seaton Sluice, Northumberland at the end of July. We thank both of them for all their work whilst at Fulwood. Malcolm has had to shoulder a heavy work load particularly whilst Yasha was on maternity leave and the problems which have ensued since. Particularly in this last year when he has had to work as the sole minister in our church and during this time he has continued to lead and guide us with great skill and sensitivity through difficult decision making. Christine has been a great support to Malcolm in all his work but also made a big contribution to the youth work in Sunday Club, OMG and Messy Church and also to many pastoral situations. We have been delighted with her leadership in teaching some of our members, young and old, to play the bells! Her contribution to the music and especially Taize services have been a delight. We will miss them both but wish them well in their journey into a new life of retirement. With the boys still living in Preston for the moment we may even have the opportunity to welcome them again from time to time as they visit family!

We will have an opportunity to say a formal farewell on Sunday 16th July when there will be a Circuit Farewell Service at Fulwood at 5.00 p.m., followed by tea and cakes.

On the morning of the 16th July Malcolm will take his last service and after that service we hope to have a Church Family Lunch to wish them well. Please put this date in your diary and join us on this special day.

Church Life

Church Life Group

In the absence of a Church Life Co-ordinator at the start of the year, Janet Wales continued to act as the temporary chair for the meetings of the Church Life Group. However, at the February Church Council she agreed to be appointed as Church Life Co-ordinator and under her leadership in the coming months the group will be reviewing its terms of reference. After a significant period of service Ted Lowes stepped down as Minute Secretary. We thank him for his work and are delighted that Pauline Kirkham has agreed to take on the role.

Children & Young People

The Church Life Group continues to receive regular reports on the activities of the various youth and children's groups whose leaders meet together in the Youth Leaders Forum. As

will be seen from their individual reports below they all have very active programmes. Work on applying for the District 'Child Friendly Church Award' has slowed down with the departure of Yasha Mashoko last May, but we are looking forward to the arrival of Darren Arnold, the new Circuit Youth, Children's & Family Worker who has been appointed to work at Fulwood from 1st August. With his experience we are expecting to make some good progress on this work in the coming year, although we expect his insights might also challenge us to think in some new ways about the place of children and young people in the Church.

Fellowship Groups & Social Activities

It is good to report that our fellowship groups are all in a healthy state and the majority of them have folk attending who don't worship with us on a Sunday. The Church Life Group meetings enable us to provide support for their activities and to share common concerns. Details of their activities are included below. Over the year we reflected on the place of social activities within the life of the Church. It was suggested that during the years of fund raising for the development project a great variety of activities were held, which included mixed generations, the mixing of groups within church and a lot of outreach contacts too. It was recognised that one of the motivations for participation and bringing people together was the sense of working towards a common goal. However, since the target was reached fewer activities have been held and it has become much more difficult to gain support from members of the congregation. We recognised that society and family life are changing all the time in our '24/7 world' where the demands on many people have grown with more complex working patterns, care for aging relatives or grandchildren and families spread more widely in geographical terms. There are also many more opportunities for individuals and families to follow their diverse interests outside the church than there were a generation ago. Alongside this, church life has changed dramatically in the last twenty years, with a more diverse congregation from a wide variety of backgrounds. The changes in society and family life have also had a dramatic effect on when people attend, what they offer, what they seek to receive and their level of commitment. On the positive side, we realise that through most of the groups and other activities organised by the Church there were many opportunities for social interaction, which have provided friendship, a sense of belonging and opportunities to join in other aspects of church life. The outreach activities of Welcome Wednesday, Famers Markets and Theatre Group in particular provide social opportunities, mixing significant numbers of folk from outside the church with members of our congregation. With this in mind, the Church Life Group recommended to the Church Council that in future we should only plan additional social events if it seems appropriate, such as an activity to tie in with a Harvest Festival, rather than planning an ongoing programme of events.

Festivals

The Christian Festivals continue to play a central role in the worship life of the Church and the Christmas services in particular draw in a large number of people from the edge of church life as well as from the local community. The Toy and Gift Service was once again very well supported, with gifts going to Surestart, the Women's Refuge and other local charities. The generosity of our congregation and the uniformed groups was remarkable, especially since the annual shoebox appeal was the previous month. Our thanks to everyone who gave so generously. A small group came together to plan the Advent and Lent liturgies that were used each week, with the emphasis on both seasons being times of preparation and discipleship for all ages. More fresh produce was displayed at the Harvest Festival last September, with it later being used in the catering at Welcome Wednesday. The gifts of tinned food and packets donated were gratefully received by Methodist Action for those in need and the financial gifts for All We Can – Methodist Relief and Development were equally appreciated.

Prayer Table

We are grateful to Margaret Holmes and Beryl Hoyle for taking on responsibility for the Prayer Table in the corner of the Church. The Prayer Book is taken into the Wednesday morning service of Holy Communion where it is used alongside the Methodist Prayer Handbook so that we pray for local concerns as well as those across the world. In addition, we have a Prayer Chain which Judith Harvey co-ordinates (details on the back of the notices).

Our thanks go to all those who work so hard to ensure that the life of our Church touches so many people's lives. Sue Penrith in her pastoral report thanks everyone who contributes to the pastoral care in the Church except herself, so we wish to place on record our gratitude for all the work she sensitively carries out on our behalf.

Worship

The Worship Planning Group continues to meet quarterly. Convened by Lesley Birkett and chaired by Malcolm Hickox, it reviews the content and pattern of our worship and makes plans for the next quarter. It is an open meeting, but we particularly encourage those who are actively involved in our worship to attend: Church and Communion Stewards, Worship Leaders, Local Preachers, musicians and youth and children's workers. In that way we hope to have a variety of views represented from a congregation with differing tastes in music, worship styles, church backgrounds and ages.

During the year we have used different patterns and liturgies for the monthly celebration of Holy Communion in the Sunday morning services, sometimes coming forward to the rail to receive and sometimes receiving the elements in the pews. The monthly evening communion service has a much smaller congregation, which enables us to create a more intimate setting and use other liturgies – the variety has been appreciated. The size of the morning congregation and the layout of the worship area place certain restrictions on what can be undertaken during morning worship, but those leading the services have still been able to include some more creative elements of music, drama and occasional video clips. The installation of a new more powerful digital projector has helped greatly in this area. We have continued to be more flexible with our pattern of evening worship which has taken place at the URC on the second and fourth Sundays and in the Chancel or Willow Grove on the other Sundays. In response to positive comments, we continued with our monthly café style services, others using Taizé or Iona liturgies and Compline, as well as informal services, which have included a prayer walk around Highgate Woods and Summer Praise. The annual Service of Remembrance for those who have been bereaved continues to be much appreciated. In response to a challenge from the Circuit Strategy & Resources Group and reflecting on the number of people attending our evening services, the Church Council has agreed that from June this year we will no longer hold any evening services at the URC. Instead, we will follow a pattern of services in our own church of a café style service on the first Sunday of the month, Holy Communion on the second Sunday and an informal service (Iona, Taizé, Compline etc) on the third Sunday. We will then join with Ashton Methodist Church for their service on the fourth Sunday and where there is a fifth Sunday, it will usually be a Circuit Service of Healing and Wholeness. Our friends at the URC have been involved in the plans and are keen to continue to join us for the evening services, as are some others who regularly come from other churches in the area. We hope this will be seen as a positive move.

The Advent and Lent Liturgies were created to provide something for all ages to experience and reflect upon, with the idea of the children searching for items hidden in the church. They much appreciated their involvement as did some of our visiting preachers. The displays created in the front porch also provided a talking point during the week and the

Advent challenge to the congregation to take a photo with the theme of light received a very good response. These different dimensions gave a real sense of building up to and preparing for the great festivals of Christmas and Easter. All the Christmas services were well received with their mix of the traditional and the new and drew in a significant number of people from the local community. Following the success of the previous year's Messy Nativity Service we repeated the format and again attracted many more children and families than would have been the case with a more traditional approach and for the first time incorporated The Bethlehem Peace Light. By way of a change, we organised a Holy Week Labyrinth rather than the usual evening meditations. Whilst a limited number from our regular congregation took advantage of the Labyrinth, those who came found it to be very moving and a significant number of our visitors on Welcome Wednesday took the opportunity to participate. A number of comments received suggested that the Labyrinth provided a powerful lead into the Holy Week services of Maundy Thursday and Good Friday and reached a climax with our Easter Day celebrations. There was a strong link between all the different services, including the 'Messy Good Friday' session, which enabled all-ages to explore the significance of the Easter message for their lives. It was a particular joy to be able to include the baptism of a father and his young son on Easter Day. Their story provided a vivid illustration of the way faith can sustain and transform our lives.

We are grateful to Emma Byers and the small team who provide the Sunday morning crèche, but we could do with more volunteers to join the rota. It's an important part of our provision enabling young families to worship with us. Our thanks also go to the Sunday Club team who provide a table with suitable guiet activities for those under five during all-age worship. In the same way, we are grateful to Eric Waterhouse for co-ordinating the minibus which allows those who are more frail or need transport to attend the morning services. However, we have now reached a critical point with available drivers and without more volunteers to join the rota we will not be able to continue to offer the minibus every Sunday. Our thanks also go to the Worship Stewards, who support the Church Stewards in the smooth preparation for the services; the Communion Stewards; the musicians; the team of sound operators; all the people willing to read and participate in dramatic presentations; the welcomers on the door; the coffee servers (we again need more volunteers); the flower arrangers and not forgetting those who count the collection. They are all an integral and important part of our worship team. If anyone would be willing to join the team, please speak to one of the Church Stewards or if you have an idea for a different service or something to be included on a Sunday, please join us at one of the Worship Planning sessions.

Music

At a time when it is more and more difficult for many churches to find suitable musicians willing to play regularly at services, Fulwood is in the happy situation of having a number of people on the rota, providing a range of different styles of music. Thanks to lan Williams, Tony Whitman, Stephen Anyon, Margery Pitcher, John Allcock, Stephen Grice, Mavis Fletcher, and the 316 Band for their various contributions to our Sunday morning and evening services. Other members also are prepared to play for the various weekday groups, and a special thanks must go to Sue Penrith, who is the reliable pianist for the Wednesday Communion services. The introduction of 'Singing the Faith' has been a good resource for some new hymns, and Malcolm has introduced us to many beautiful and meaningful words to well-known tunes. There is a small group of singers who meet every Sunday before Worship to practice the hymns. They would be very happy for anyone to join them – no audition necessary!

Sunday Club

Numbers of children attending Sunday Club continue to be stable with 47 names on the database. This does not include however the large number of children who come with

baptismal parties for just one Sunday and we are aware of the need to have systems in place to promote our work with these young people. Average attendance is considerably less than 47 with numbers varying from 22 to 5. This reflects the attendance pattern for the whole church but puts considerable pressure on leaders when planning material. Six leaders work with the children on a rota basis when possible but the demands of the work mean that adults may not get the opportunity to worship in church and deepen their own spiritual experiences and learning. All leaders have updated their safeguarding training and we work hard to ensure good practice in our provision.

This 'academic/church' year we have followed six themes. We began in September with 'God's world' which gave young people an opportunity to discuss different views on creation and evolution and consider how science and religion can complement each other. We then looked at some of the major Old Testament figures before our Advent and Christmas theme. In January we began a series of topics about the Bible – its format, development etc. our Lent and Easter theme looked at the Passover and Exodus and its links with the Last Supper and the Easter Story. Our final theme for this year will be looking at the growth of the Early Church and the work of Apostles such as Peter and Paul. Although we plan our work in themes in reality, we deliver a series of 'one offs' as it is unusual to have the same children there for two consecutive Sundays (see below *Goal 2*). All the themes link to our underpinning values and aims outlined at the end of this report.

Progress against 2016 goals and future action

Goal 1. Prepare information about Sunday Club for the Church website.

Basic information and a poster are now available and progress is being made with a more detailed leaflet. We also want to have cards available to give to visitors.

Action: complete leaflets and design cards to promote the work.

Goal 2: continue to develop range of activities to meet needs of young people at different ages and stages of development.

All sessions are prepared on a range of levels to meet the learning and social needs of the children and young people. Older children are encouraged to ask questions and think critically about the topics. A variety of activities allows children and young people to engage with the work in different ways. However infrequent attendance can mean that children miss the key aspects of a theme.

Action: continue to develop ways of working effectively with children and young people at different ages and ensure they engage with the basic messages of teaching in themes.

Goal 3: Contribute to the church application for the Child Friendly Church award.

Little formal development has been made as we await the appointment of a family and youth worker to take this forward. Sunday Cub staff continue to ensure that all sessions follow good practice policies.

Action – support application for award

Goal 4: Work with parents to maximise learning and experiences.

The development of the Facebook site has been a highly successful way of keeping in touch with families and helping them to know what we are doing. Most weeks a reminder about the theme is posted and then photos of activities after the session are published. Video clips used in the session are also included. Some families are starting to use Facebook as a way of communicating with us.

Action – explore further developments with social media with emphasis on keeping in touch with families.

In addition to these goals, we are eager to explore ways of further embedding Sunday Club in the life of the church. There have been useful links with Messy Church at Christmas and Easter and the Lenten liturgy provided a coherent approach to worship and learning.

Action: devise ways of involving more adults with Sunday Club. e.g. visiting the sessions

August and September will see many changes. We look forward to working with Darren Arnold, the new Youth, Children's & Family Worker and Jane Wild our new minister, but also want to thank Malcolm for his continuing support for our work and his help with ensuring that what we do is child friendly and also theologically sound. We shall miss him.

Every baptismal service the congregation is asked to make promises about maintaining the life and worship of the church and Sunday Club is one way in which this is put into practice. We need your support, prayers and care to continue our work.

Aims and Values

Sunday Club aims to help children and young people to discover:

- 1. That they are special to God whose love is there for us.
- 2. The nature of the God we see revealed in the life of Jesus.
- 3. What it means to be a follower of Jesus
- 4. Who they are as creatures created by God, in God's image
- 5. That they belong to God's people the Church

Safeguarding

Women's Fellowship

Our average attendance has been 20 - 25 members at the weekly meetings. Once again, we have enjoyed a very varied programme from September 2016 - 2017. World Church

The Farmers' Markets have continued regularly and for the rest of this year will be on 27th May, 22nd July, 23rd September and 25th November from 9.30 a.m. until 1.00 p.m. Do remember to support these events as we continue to encourage everyone to think of where our produce and foodstuffs are sourced. We thank Anne Garsed for all her hard work promoting the work of both Christian Aid and Fairtrade throughout our church and community.

Theatre Group

As will be seen from their report, the Theatre Group continues to thrive with visits made to many exciting productions across the north of England as well as an overnight stay in Stratford on Avon. The Outreach Group and Church Council see this activity as an important part of our Church outreach. An open meeting was held in the New Year to discuss a more transparent way of booking, charging and administering the ever popular visits. The meeting was attended by around 30 people and a reference group has been set up to support Ken and Sharon in their work.

Christmas and other Activities

We again had a good response to our appeal for singers to join us singing carols around the residential homes on two evenings. Our visits are always well received and it was much easier with many more voices to swell the throng. We are looking for someone to liaise with the homes before our visits this year. Sue Penrith has done this for many years and we thank her for all her hard work. This is not an onerous task and only requires the use of a telephone to arrange the visits once a year. If you think you could take this on please contact Sue or myself.

The Festive Lunch was again a great success. We provided a hot lunch with all the trimmings for over 80 people from our Church and community. We were pleased to welcome our Community Choir who entertained us both before and after the meal with a variety of songs and carols. This is an opportunity for anyone who finds themselves alone over the Christmas period to share a meal and entertainment with others from both inside and outside the church. Thank you to all the helpers who gave up their time during the Christmas holiday. As New Year's Day was on a Sunday this year we decided to change to the time of worship to 12.00 noon and combine it with the opportunity to share lunch and family worship together. Around 50/60 people enjoyed the informal fellowship and worship.

Churches Together in Fulwood and Broughton (CTFB)

CTFB continues to provide volunteers to staff the help desk at the Royal Preston Hospital, although additional volunteers are now urgently needed. A programme of ecumenical meetings was arranged for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in January which focused on the 'Five Marks of Mission'. We were pleased to organise the last well-supported meeting on the environment, which took the form of a café service in the Willow Grove. Adverts were taken out in the Fulwood Focus magazine to publicise the local

churches' Christmas and Easter Service. A pilgrimage was again held in the autumn, on this occasion to Cartmel in Cumbria.

We are a very active church at Fulwood, trying to connect particularly with our local community. Thank you to all our committed volunteers for all our outreach events. However, none of the events above would happen without a lot of dedication from a small number of people. If you think you could offer to help out serving coffee or chatting with people even once in a while please speak to Libby or myself and we will make sure you are added to the rotas. Likewise, if you have any new ideas of ways we can reach out to our local community please let us know.

Action for Children (AFC)

It has been a good year for AFC. We sent a cheque for £405.50 in July which covered the collection on Action for Children Sunday and a donation from the Church. Previously at Christmas, we had sent £650 from our Christmas services collections. The League of Light lantern boxes which are emptied in March and April raised the very acceptable sum of £1228.64. This was comprised of the boxes from the former Deepdale folk, looked after by Margaret Holmes, which amounted to £436.79, and the remainder emptied by Pauline Kirkham, which amounted to £791.85. If anyone would like to have a lantern box, please contact Pauline who will be happy to supply one. We no longer hold a House to House collection or a store collection.

Property Group

The Property Group has met four times during the past year. Recent work by the Group and its members include:

Building

- **Contract**: The contract for the supply of GAS is currently being negotiated by Sharon. It is likely to lead to significant financial savings.
- **BT**: The BT contract has now been re-negotiated, removing several services that were never or no longer required.
- **Projector**: A new higher resolution projector has been installed in the Church.
- **Audio/Visual**: A new DVD player has been purchased and connected to the standmounted television in the Copper Beech Room. Small flat-screen televisions have been placed on the west side of the pulpit and in front of the electronic piano in church to display the same information as screened by the projector during church services.
- **Quinquennial inspection**: The quinquennial (building) inspection was carried out in December 2016. The report was received in March which listed a number of minor items which may need attention over the next 5 years. The Property Group reviewed this list at their May meeting.
- The **Electrical System Quinquennial inspection** was conducted in the summer and defects rectified. We await the final report.
- Lightning protection: The lightning conductor was visually inspected by ourselves and then tested in October by an approved contractor (as required by Methodist Insurance). The test result was not satisfactory so an additional earth mat was installed. This improved the result but not sufficiently to meet the standard. A third mat was installed in April – we await the test result.

- **Outside repointing**: The pointing around various windows has been repaired to make weatherproof.
- **Wall damage**: The low wall outside the Copper Beach Room, which was demolished by a vehicle, has been repaired.
- Floors: The Oak Hall and Willow Grove floors have been given their annual re-sealing.
- **Kitchen**: Splashback tiling has been installed behind the sink and other working areas.
- **Insurance:** The excess on the insurance has been increased from £50 to £500 resulting in a reduction of the annual premium of nearly £850.

Health, Safety and Security

- **Portable (Electrical) Appliance Testing (PAT)**: All portable electrical equipment was tested in October 2016 by the in-house team.
- The Fire Alarm and Emergency Lighting systems have been tested.

Ongoing and near-future work

- West Chancel Window wall: The wall now needs redecoration.
- **Oak Hall window**: The wall (around the door to the Copper Beech room) needs redecoration
- Car Parks: The front and rear car parks will be resurfaced over the summer.
- **Cedar Room Projector**: A computer projector will be purchased and mounted to the ceiling of the Cedar Room projecting onto the screen in front of the cupboards. Controls will be wired back to the electronics in the left hand cupboard.
- **High off-ground property inspections:** Following his very conscientious work in undertaking repairs and maintenance in several high-level locations, it is intended to ask Mark Dawson to conduct a high off-ground inspection of the whole premises on a five-year basis.

The Property Group wish to again put on record our grateful thanks to all volunteers for their splendid work during the year in maintaining and cleaning our premises and looking after our garden.

Key messages on the General Fund position:

- Income from offerings continues to fall. We need to encourage church members to review the level of offering they are able to make on a regular basis.
- The financial contribution from outreach activities continues strong. The net contribution in the year to 31st August 2016 after expenses was £20,115 (2015: £21,279). As agreed by the Church Council, we have transferred 10% of this balance to the church projects fund.
- Other receipts include a donation of £10,000 in the year. This has been transferred to a new Special Projects Fund. The Church Council will decide how this fund is used.

- The increase in staff costs is due to the employment of a new Church Administrator and a new sessional Youth Worker. Transfers of funds have been made by the Theatre Group to offset the majority of the Administrator's salary costs.
- The significant increase in miscellaneous payments is due to one-off Land Registry fees.

Internal Funds

Key messages:

- In reviewing the balance on the Theatre Group, please note that this includes expenditure on tickets which have not yet been sold.
- The transfer from the Theatre Group to the General fund covers 75% of the cost of employing the new Church Administrator.
- Balances on the Escape/Youth Club and Toddler Club funds have risen significantly. We encourage these groups to consider how to spend these funds as these activities are not intended for building reserves.
- The increase in the Church Projects fund includes the 10% outreach levy of £2,020. A donation of £1000 has been made from the fund to the Circuit in respect of Sierra Leone. A transfer was also made to General Fund of £1000 in respect of a donation to McMillan in 2014/15 which was paid from General Funds in error. At year end we were in a position to make donations to two further projects agreed by the Outreach Group.

- We have had confirmation from the District that the District Fund per Chris Penrith's records is not owed to them. We have therefore released this fund with the Finance Group recommending to the Church Council that we transfer this fund as follows: £1000 to the Benevolence Fund, £1000 to the General Fund and the balance of £1,496 to a new Minibus Fund.
- As approved by church council, the £10,000 donation received in April has been transferred to a Special Projects fund. The Church Council will be responsible for approving the expenditure of this fund.
